

### Pastor's Letter

### **Flowers**



Although not specifically mentioned, flowers get their beginning in Genesis and the third day of creation. The Lord created dry ground and vegetation, including trees bearing fruit with seed in it. We all know that fruit trees bear flowers before producing fruit. So, flowers have been in existence since Day 3.

Here is a partial list of flowers that are mentioned: a rose (probably a crocus) (Song of Songs 2:1), lilies (lily of the valley in Song of Songs 2:16 is known as the Easter lily, Song of Songs 5:13's lily has a bloom like a glowing flame, the lilies of the

field in Matthew 6:28 were more wildflowers), almond blossoms (Numbers 17:8), pomegranate blossoms and henna (or camphire) flowers (Song of Songs 4:13), stinkweed (or cockle flowers) (Job 31:40), nutmeg (or dill or cummin) (Isaiah 28:25-27), mandrakes (Genesis 30:14), myrtle branches (Nehemiah 8:15), and saffron (Song of Songs 4:14).

Perhaps you noticed that many of the references are from Song of Songs. If you know the book, it's not surprising. It also demonstrates the challenge of putting modern terms for flowers with the ancient Hebrew. Translators do their best, but it can be hard.

In general, flowers grew abundantly during springtime in Palestine. Flowers grew mostly in open fields since flower gardens, as we now know them, were not cultivated. Flowers grew in crop fields and in groves of trees around houses.


### Pastor's Letter (Continued)

Numerous kinds of wildflowers could be found in the plains and mountains of Palestine. The word "flower" or "flowers" refer to colorful blossoms, towering plants, open flowers, and flourishing flowers. In Palestine the warm spring temperatures joined with the winter rains to produce beautiful, blooming plants and flowers. (Holman Bible Dictionary)

Some of the flowers mentioned above have an interesting twist. The almond blossom of Numbers has to do with Aaron's staff. The Israelites were grumbling against Moses and Aaron and so Moses gathered the staffs from the leaders of Israel and put them in the Tent of Meeting. The next morning, Aaron's staff, which represented the tribe of Levi, had budded, blossomed and produced almonds. Also, the lampstand in the Tabernacle had almond buds and blossoms for each of the six branches.

Many flowers were used in the making of perfume. Therefore, it is possible that some of these flowers were used in the aromatic resin used in the Tabernacle on the Altar of Incense. For instance, calamus leaves were a sweet-smelling cane or ginger grass and were used in worship.

The Rose of Sharon mentioned in Song of Songs 2:1, many feel, is a type of Christ and is sometimes used in Christmas songs. Sharon is the Hebrew word for plain, as in the plain or flatlands of Israel near the Mediterranean Sea. The Hebrew word translated rose is probably a crocus, or some other flower that comes from a bulb. In context, the bride of the song is claiming, "I'm just a wildflower, a poor overlooked country girl." Her lover responds, "You may be just a wildflower lily, but all the other girls are thorns by comparison." So how is this a reference to Christ? Cross-referencing with Isaiah 35:1-2, basically the picture is this: in the desert blooms this beautiful flower. In barren Israel blooms the Christ, the glory of the Lord.



In the New Testament, Jesus uses the flowers of the field to teach us not to worry. "Why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labor or spin. Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these" (Matthew 6:28-29).

Scripture compares the temporary nature of life to the temporary nature of flowers. "All people are like grass, and all their glory is like the flowers of the field; the grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of the Lord endures forever" (1 Pet. 1:24-25 quoting Isaiah 40:6-7).

The flowers of spring (Song 2:12) signify renewal. The "fading flower" of Isaiah 28:1 represented the downfall of God's disobedient people.

As you can see, flowers have their special place in Scripture. They probably have a special place in your heart, too. (Although I have a relative who does not like flowers.) Others have allergies or aversions to flowers. To each their own. But for most, especially with Mother's Day happening this month, flowers will be in your future. Perhaps they will trigger some thoughts shared here with you.



### **Door Offering: Apache Mission**

In 2018, the Apache Mission celebrated 125 years of God's blessings as the first world mission of WELS. The Apache Mission is located in eastern Arizona on the Fort Apache Reservation and the San Carlos Apache Reservation.



(NOTE: Our mission predates Arizona as a state.) Between the two reservations there are eight churches, one preaching station, and two Lutheran elementary schools. The Apache Lutheran churches are currently training future leaders for work as evangelists, teachers, and pastors through the Apache Christian Training School (ACTS). Our door offerings go to support this mission work.

Happy Spring! This past month our Bible stories and songs are centered on Jesus' death, resurrection, and his disciples' work. These stories and songs remind us of Jesus' power, mercy and love. We've been practicing singing "The Butterfly Song", and "Oh how I Love Jesus".

Sunshine themes this past month have included spring, Easter, growing things, and measuring. Our art last month included: spring tree art, painting birdhouses, 3-D flowers, and a variety of Easter themed arts and crafts. In science,


Rainbow class enjoyed painting ice cream cone carrots, and creating shape tractors. Along with reading spring and farm books.

### **3K News:**





### **Baked Cream Cheese French Toast Casserole**

(served at Sunday, April 14, Bible class, submitted by Diane Retzlaff)
This baked cream cheese french toast casserole is stuffed with sweet cream cheese and topped with a brown sugar crumble topping. It's a wonderful recipe for a brunch or breakfast gathering because you can prep the casserole the night before.

### **Ingredients**

- 1 loaf french bread, sourdough bread
- 8 oz full-fat brick cream cheese, softened to room temperature\*
- 2 T confectioners' sugar
- 3 tsp. pure vanilla extract, divided
- 8 large eggs
- 2-1/4 C whole milk
- 3/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- 2/3 C packed light brown sugar

### **Crumb Topping**

- 1/3 C packed light brown sugar
- 1/3 C all-purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 6 T butter, cold and cubed
- optional: maple syrup and/or confectioners' sugar for topping

### Instructions

- Grease a 9×13-inch baking pan or any 3-4 quart oven-safe dish with nonstick spray. Slice then cut the bread into cubes, about 1 inch in size. Spread half of the cubes into the prepared baking pan.
- Using a handheld or stand mixer fitted with a
  whisk attachment, beat the room temperature
  cream cheese on medium-high speed until
  completely smooth. Beat in the confectioners'
  sugar and 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract until
  combined. Drop random spoonfuls of cream
  cheese mixture on top of the bread. Layer the
  remaining bread cubes on top of cream cheese.
  Set aside.
- Whisk the eggs, milk, cinnamon, brown sugar, and remaining vanilla together until no brown sugar lumps remain. Pour evenly over the bread. Cover the pan tightly with plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least 3-4 hours and up to 24 hours. Overnight is best.
- Preheat oven to 350°F (177°C). Remove pan from the refrigerator.
- Prepare the crumb topping: Whisk the brown sugar, flour, and cinnamon together in a medium bowl. Cut in the cold cubed butter with a pastry blender or two forks. Sprinkle the topping evenly over the soaked bread.

### Member Recipes Continued

 Bake uncovered for 45-55 minutes or until golden brown on top. Serve with optional maple syrup or dust with confectioners' sugar. Serve warm.

### **Notes**

- Bread: Day-old, crusty bread is perfect for french toast casseroles. Slice and cut it into 1-inch cubes and let it sit out uncovered all day. You'll have about 12 cups of cubed bread—a little more or less is fine.
- Cream Cheese: Since the cream cheese is only mixed with a little sugar and vanilla, make sure you are using quality cream cheese that tastes good.

- Half Recipe: This recipe can easily be halved in an 8-inch or 9-inch baking pan. The bake time will be slightly shorter, around 30-35
- Can I add berries? Some readers have added blueberries, blackberries, and/or raspberries sprinkled throughout the casserole. Feel free to scatter 1 cup of fresh berries over the spoonfuls of cream cheese before topping with the remaining bread cubes. I do not recommend frozen berries.

Currently, he works for the Administrator for World Missions, Larry Schlomer, and helps out with Academia Cristo, which is now in its 10th year of ministry. Academia Cristo begins with online modules and works into more concentrated study. Similar models are being used around the world and even in the United States. He introduced a fairly new ministry called DMF or "Diaspora Ministry Facilitator". This group supports people of different cultures in the United States and connects them to each other and to current WELS congregations. The goal is to support and/or create multi-cultural ministries through this program. It was all very interesting.

He has left a lasting impact on KML through his selfless, servant leadership. We pray for him and his family as they transition to serve at Illinois Lutheran Schools.

Our KML leadership and Executive Committee of the Board of Directors has been in discussion of next steps, and there is a high likelihood that, due to timing, we will wait to call for this position until October of 2024. This would give us time to reflect on and analyze and prioritize the duties and goals of this important position while ensuring a larger pool of candidates early in the calling season that fit for today and the future.

### **KML Schools Curriculum Director Position**

We continue to work with our new KML Schools Curriculum Director, Stefanie Herbert, in her transition to the KML Federation in July. She was able to attend our ALHS high school conference where she was able to collaborate with curriculum leaders from high schools

across our synod. KML has invoiced the 12 federation schools that will be participating to support this position. They will pay this fee annually in the spring to pay for both this position and other professional development and supply expenses.

### Let's Grow Together Capital Campaign and Facility Expansion

The KML Team worked and continues to work diligently on finalizing plans to go out to bid, financing, approvals, and fundraising. Just as God has blessed us through this whole process, we also trust that he will continue to guide us. Here are some updates about the process:

- Most Recent All In Cost of Construction: The cost analysis of construction by Catalyst at the end of January was \$13,551,114. This would include everything including the 3rd court, multipurpose room, and finishing the second floor. It does not include the office renovation.
- Construction Plans Out to Bid: Excel Engineering completed the bid plans for our expansion, and Catalyst Construction sent them out to bid on March 26. They expect those bids back by April 16. It is our hope that we will have solid cost numbers by our Monday, April 23 Board of Directors meetings.
- Town of Jackson Planning Commission Approval: The Town of Jackson Planning Commission approved our facility expansion on Wednesday, March 27. As a part of the expansion process, we are also working to get the Sherman Rd. entrance approved for future use.
   We are striving to understand what needs to be done to improve that intersection and what the costs will be.
- Bond Financing: Jody Hansen continues to work with Baird to ensure all of the processes and approvals are in place for the additional borrowing (\$6.SM) and reissuing of our current bonds. The Finance Committee continues to analyze our short and long term financial capabilities on a monthly basis to manage this additional debt.

- Let's Grow Together Capital Campaign: We continue to see progress, and we're still waiting on several factors that could help get us closer to our goal of \$10M.
  - Our many generous gifts and pledges currently stand at \$6,323,094.51 as of Wednesday, April 3.
  - The Finance Committee had placed our capital campaign cash in interest yielding accounts and have accrued \$122,646 in interest over this school year. That is already included in the gift and pledges above.
  - The State of Wisconsin Grant (\$GM submitted 1/31), has moved their approval timeline back to late summer/early fall.
  - We are waiting to hear grant proposals to the following foundations: Bradley Foundation (\$300,000 - would be awarded in May) Batterman Foundation (\$100,000 - would be awarded in June) and the Neumann Family Foundation (\$50,000 would be awarded in summer.)
  - As noted in the Mission Advancement Report, we also pray that the Lord would bless our Spring Appeal, Gala, anticipated estate gifts, and discussions with potential individual donors.




### Christian Life Resources' Branch Updates
